Get Involved

We are in need some volunteers to help get things spruced up and ready for the public. Workday is scheduled for Saturday April 6 9:00 am to noon

A few hours from each family in the spring goes a long way to making this facet of our community a better place.

Some basic outside cleanup is needed as well as a tidying up inside the building.

If you plan to help with outdoor clean-up, please bring gloves and weather appropriate clothing. Rakes, trimmers, pruning shears are needed for this task. Interior cleaning will include windows, floors, and exhibit space.

Supervised children are welcome to participate. Consider helping us and teach the youngsters hands on community support.

Witmer Barn Preservation

Volunteers led by Paul Hoffer replaced the siding and windows on the south side of the Witmer barn which was originally constructed in 1856. The large German bank barn is located at the Blue Rock river access and stores antique farm equipment and supplies. The siding and windows needed replaced and volunteers decided they would undertake the task.

The volunteers removed the siding on a Saturday morning in July and showed up on Monday to start installing the new cedar siding. It took labors consisting of 4-6 members working a total of 5 days to replace the siding and windows on the south side of the building. The siding and windows were also painted within this time frame.

LASA (Lancaster Area Sewer Authority) owns the barn, and leases it to the Blue Rock Heritage Center. LASA purchased all materials and supplies including renting a lift.

Volunteers are ready to replace the siding on the west side and possibly the north side this year. We will post a sign at the site with the anticipated start dates and welcome volunteers to assist.

Barns such as this were once very common in Lancaster County, but due to several factors many are disappearing from out landscape. The German bank barn was a very efficient barn for early farming practices. The bank barn style was brought along with the early Swiss and German settlers. Animals were located on the ground floor and since three sides were surrounded by dirt, the area stayed warm during the winter months. The main floor stored hay, grain and farm equipment. The large doors allowed for access to the center floor which was known as the threshing floor. Large equipment would thresh the grain in the fall, separating the grain from the chaff. Doors on the main floor overlooked the forebay allowing farmers to toss feed to animals on the ground.

We are thankful to all who helped to make this preservation effort a success and for the partnership with LASA as they exhibit stewardship toward the historic buildings under their ownership.
